# **HIV in Boston**




### Methods


- Data were collected by Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH) according to CDC surveillance criteria
- De-identified data are provided to the Boston Public Health Commission (BPHC)
  - Currently data for cases reported through 2013 are available
- Case location is defined as the place where the person resides at the time of HIV diagnosis
  - "Boston cases" include person living in Boston at the time of HIV diagnosis



### **Boston: New HIV Cases Reported by Year**

- There were 190\* HIV cases reported in Boston residents in 2013.
  - 31 cases per 100,000








### Boston 2013 Cases: Gender

• Most reported HIV cases in 2013 were men (76%).






# Boston 2013 Cases: Race/Ethnicity

 Black (non-Hispanic) and Latino residents account for 24% and 17% of the Boston population respectively, but accounted for 35% and 31% of HIV cases reported in 2013.









# Boston 2013 Cases: Age at Diagnosis

• The majority of cases (61%) were diagnosed at ages 20-44 years.








# Boston 2013 Cases: Risk Exposure

• Men who have sex with men (MSM) made up the largest proportion (49%) of new HIV cases in 2013.






### **Boston 2013 Cases: Risk Exposure (Continued)**

### MSM

- Over 50% of all Boston cases with MSM risk were White residents, however the majority of MSM cases ages 13-29 years were men of color
- Over 50% of new MSM cases were less than 35 years old
  - 20-24 year olds represented the largest MSM age group for new cases in 2013
- Heterosexual
  - Over 80% of all cases with heterosexual exposure (including presumed heterosexual) were in Black or Latina women

### Boston 2013 HIV Cases: Country of Origin

• 36% of Boston resident HIV cases reported in 2013 were born outside the United States.






# Boston: AIDS Cases, 2013

- 79 Boston residents were diagnosed with AIDS in 2013
  - Includes people living with HIV who progressed to AIDS AND people initially diagnosed with AIDS at initial diagnosis
- From 2011-2013, 150 of 572 new Boston resident HIV cases (26%) were concurrently\* diagnosed with AIDS
  - This may be a marker of late presentation for care.




### Reported Diagnoses of HIV Infection, Boston 2012-13
